Updated Cell phones in School Policy

In line with new requirements, our cell phone policy at school is still the same - away for the day! Here is our formal policy regarding cell phones and personal digital devices:

Glenbrae School does not allow students to bring personal digital devices to school. These are not necessary to have during the day.

We discuss the school rules about personal digital devices at the beginning of the year, and throughout the year as needed. Any changes to our school rules are communicated to students and our school community.

Parent/Caregiver and student responsibilities

If a parent/caregiver needs to contact their child urgently during the day, they should call the office.

If a student brings a personal digital device to our school, the following guidelines apply:

- The school does not accept responsibility for lost, damaged, or stolen personal digital devices brought to the school but investigates any issues as appropriate.
- Should a student bring in a personal digital device, they must hand in their device to the office
 or their teacher at the beginning of the day, and can collect the device at the end of the day.

Personal digital devices may not be taken on EOTC events.

Students are expected to follow our **Digital Technology and Online Safety** policy when using personal digital devices on school property or the school network.

Inappropriate use

If we see a student using a personal digital device inappropriately, we confiscate it. After the student locks the device, we place it in the office to be collected at the end of the day.



THE KEY PHASES OF DEVELOPMENT

TUPU - PRE-INCEPTION

Tupu - ancestral knowledge and growth.

We draw from lessons learnt by past
kaimahi, before we begin work.

A 'Commencement Notice' for a site is issued. This notice lets TRC know that the land is ready to be prepped for redevelopment. We receive word of this through Kāinga Ora.



PŌ/RANGI - FEASIBILITY

Night turns into day (Rangi).

At this stage, we test if our vision is 'feasible' (capable of being done).

Drawing from the approved Opportunity Memo, our teams will work with architects on what housing options we can deliver on the amount of land we have, considering both community aspirations and the cost.

A few options (along with a recommended option) are then presented to the Board to review and approve one of them.



TE PO-INCEPTION

Pō - darkness or night. We cannot yet see the path ahead.

Now we envision what the completed development could look like. Our teams draw from the aspirations of community, iwi and other stakeholders, and then put it to paper for our board to approve.

This document is called an 'Opportunity Memo', because it highlights the opportunities of the site.

After board approval, Masterplanning will prepare a 'Design Scope' - a more technical/detailed document to give to the architects working alongside us.



THE KEY PHASES OF DEVELOPMENT



MOANA - DEVELOPED DESIGN

We take our waka to the sea.

Now that our vision is approved, our teams work together to prepare a 'Building Consent' application to Auckland Council.

This outlines <u>how</u> we will build. It includes information from the structure of our new homes to the materials that will be used etc., to ensure we will build to the quality of our vision.



KAINGA - OCCUPATION/ LESSONS LEARNT

Taking time to reflect on the journey.

The work is done and the completed whare are now someone's kāinga (home).

At this stage, we return to our homebase to reflect through wananga. We korero about what went right and what we can improve on for next time.



RANGI - PRELIMINARY DESIGN

The path is illuminated. We can now see what's ahead of us.

TRC must now seek consent from Auckland Council to kick off the vision.

Our teams work together to prepare and send a detailed document pack that outlines our vision and the impact the development will have on the community, land, and environment.


This process is called obtaining 'Resource Consent'.

Building begins!

With all approvals gained, we can now breathe life into our vision and build! We ensure our developments match the quality of our vision, so that we can proudly hand these beautiful new whare over to whānau.

Ongoing Key Reminders and Notices

Vaping or smoking on school grounds is completely unacceptable at Glenbrae School. Students who bring these items to school will face the consequences for doing so.

If you have changed any of your contact details please keep the office informed. We need to be able to contact you in an emergency and these details are vital to be kept updated!

Absences - please call the office on 09 528 5025 if your child is not coming to school that day. If we do not hear from you, we will txt you and after numerous days away, we may have to place a referral to our attendance service for follow up.

Fizzy drink, lollies, chocolate, chewing gum etc are a big NO NO at school. If found, they will be confiscated and returned at the end of each day. We look forward to your support on this. We supply free lunches so there is no need to drop off lunch if you child has forgotten it that day!

Keep it named! Please name every piece of uniform your child has. This makes it so much easier to find when your little one may have left something behind.

Valuables/money/phones that get brought to school and get lost are completely the child's responsibility and the school will not search for or be responsible for these lost items if they are brought to school!

Students are not permitted to bring mobile phones/smart watches to school. If they bring one, they need to hand it to their teacher to look after during the day.

Glenbrae School has a uniform which is available for purchasing at the office. The correct school uniform needs to be worn every day, which includes a Glenbrae School hat during Terms 1 and 4.

OPEN DOOR POLICY Our school runs on an "Open Door Policy". This means that should you have any questions or concerns about anything please do not hesitate to contact us. Don't be a stranger, but pop in anytime you can. We'd love to see you! If at any time you wish to see any of your child's teachers about something specific please telephone the school to organize an appointment. At times there are bound to be issues that crop up and we encourage you to air your concerns but ask that you speak to the person involved first. If you have done this and feel there has been no success, you are more than welcome to see the relevant senior staff member or myself. If you are wanting information on your child's progress, it is advisable to book a time to see teacher. This will enable the teacher to give you the time you deserve to have the proper conversation. Classrooms are busy places in the mornings before school and immediately after, and it is not always possible for the teacher to give full attention to your queries if you do not book in advance.

All visitors to the school must sign in at the office upon arrival. This includes your high school aged students who return back to school!

Uniform Reminders

Please ensure your child is wearing black shoes to school please. This is our school uniform. Please see some examples on what black school shoes are acceptable. Glenbrae School's uniform is the same for boys and girls, with girls having the option of wearing shorts or the skort. We encourage parents to purchase at least two school uniform T-shirts which have the school logo and a school uniform blue jumper which has our school logo on it. The black school shorts are to be worn in the summer months. Plain black trousers/long pants can be worn during the winter terms which are Term 2 and Term 3.

We have had an amazing term 2 with particular highlights being our School Market Day and a fascinating trip to the Stardome!




Market Day Fun Our Market Day was a blast! Students loved the running games,


A FEW WEEKS AGO, WE HAD OUR VERY FIRST MARKET DAY HERE AT GLENBRAE SCHOOL. THIS
